St James Church recently underwent a transformation as over 700 children from local primary schools took their seats for a journey back, back to the future of their lives and back to the history of the church, told in a series of nativity sketches, narrated by old Mary and Joseph, as the story of the star, the wise scientists and the angels unfolded before their eyes.

The story was supplemented by various activities. This included making stars, an interpretation of modern Christmas, a journey to the stars, and the popular Shepherd's learning zone, where our visitors were taught how to scare away wolves, heal poorly sheep and search for fresh pasture, all whilst following the angel's instructions, heading for a newborn baby in Bethlehem.

It was fantastic to see all the smiley, happy faces, the thrill as they saw a real baby Jesus emerge from the vestry and make his/her way towards the manger in the middle of the dais. Eyes lit up, hearts fluttered and there were sudden gasps of 'it's a real baby' or, as one little boy remarked, "it's Jesus"!

The care and huge attention to detail that had gone into every aspect was superb. From the writing, the costumes, the props, learning of scripts and the vast decorative decor that had gone into transforming our everyday church into a place of pilgrimage, peace and presence, sharing the giving heart of God with small people.

It would be impossible to write an article like this without mentioning all the hard work of Sarah in pulling it all together and staying calm(ish) throughout the week.

Looking back, I'm thinking of all the hundreds of children that have journeyed through our doors this past week, hoping and praying that something of the life and faith that we share has perhaps touched their hearts, their lives, and will lodge in their memory, like the boy who told his younger sister, on her coming to the Stable, about every single aspect that had happened to him at his visit two years before. Over the twenty plus years Journey to the Stable has been performed, it is estimated that over 15,000 children will have visited us!

It was certainly memorable for me and I'm sure it was for them too ... another Stable Journey completed, another year, another load of children making their Christmas pilgrimage, back to the future of Christmas.


Accidental Hitman by A.W. Wilson



FOODBANK UPDATE

Many thanks for the small saucepans which came in during November and December. We have been able to give one each plus basic cutlery, a bowl, a plate, and a mug to the young men living in a local hostel. They are often newly out of prison, allocated a room in a House of Multiple Occupancy where the kitchen and bathroom are supposed to be fully resourced by the Landlord. Ho!!! Ho!!! They are very grateful and,whatever they have done in the past, it feels good to help them along just a little bit. They do look young ...

I mentioned previously that I was in a dilemma about how to spend a small amount of money given to me; in the end I blew the lot on large size nappies. Folks sometimes donate newborn ones, and sizes 1 and 2, but the most frequently requested sizes are the larger ones, 5,6,7 and even 8. I hope some Small Beings will have had a comfortable Christmas Day!

Parents were encouraged to choose a present for each of their children from the gift tables at Sparkhill Food Bank; not all the toys/games/clothing were new, but all were in very good condition. We had accumulated them during the year. David put new batteries in the toys, kind folks like Jean Wall, Gwen Albrow and others dressed the dolls (underwear by courtesy and design of Janet Wilson), my neighbour created dolls' beds out of mango boxes and pillowslips.

And colouring/sticker books in bags with felt tips, rubbers etc. And if a small bar of chocolate had fallen in with the gift, well ...

We were also able to offer knitted hats and mittens, thanks to Glenys Arkell, Margaret Barber and other Knitters of This Parish.

Many thanks for the wonderful support you have given to "our" local Food Bank; when we started helping at the first Food Bank down in Bard Street many years ago, we thought that the need might exist for a year or two. Whatever happened? Part of the problem is the huge rise in the cost of renting in the private sector as the local authorities have less social housing to offer; rent now swallows up a huge percentage of folks' benefits.

On June 7th 2025, I'll be taking a huge leap - literally out of a plane! Don't worry, I'll be strapped to a qualified instructor who I trust completely.

But what's driving me to do this?

For years, I've lived with depression. It sneaks up on me, often hidden behind the laughter and energy people know me for.

People see me as the life of the party, and I am! I'm the crazy, fun one with wild stories and lots of memorable moments. But having an outgoing personality doesn't mean I'm immune to struggle. Sometimes, those who seem the most carefree carry the heaviest burdens.



The reality is that hundreds of lives are lost every year to mental health issues, and 1 in 5 people face this battle. And this isn't just my story; I've lost people to depression, and it's left deep wounds in my heart and their families.

We need to normalize speaking up when we're struggling - whether we're men or women, young or old. Keeping it all inside only deepens the pain. This jump is my way of confronting fear, of taking one bold step toward confidence. When those hard days come, I'll be able to look back on this and remember what I'm capable of.

SHIRLEY PARISH ECO GROUP

Which Rubbish is Actually Rubbish?

The Eco Group is a sub-committee of our PCC, and its brief is to look into the fifth of our Anglican Marks of Mission, to 'strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth'

It is to this end that we regularly encourage everyone to save water, use less plastic, be mindful of the things that we buy, carefully use the things that we have, and to consider acquiring less 'stuff' by reusing, re-purposing and recycling the things that we already have. These are big asks, and bringing these things to God in prayer often helps us to realise that we can't always have what we want but must give them up for the greater good of the planet and it's peoples (amongst whom are our grandchildren - let's do it for them).

There are three rubbish/recycling stations on our premises; one in the kitchen in Church House, one in the St James Church sacristy, and one at the back of St James Church near the main entrance. The three recycling bins are often contaminated with unrecyclable waste so that the whole binfull has to be put with the rubbish. However, one member of the Eco committee goes through the recycling bins and removes all the rubbish that's in them so that the rest can go into the big recycling bin outside Church House. PLEASE improve this situation by recycling correctly!!! Do not put paper of any kind into the recycling bins, as it is often contaminated. To help the situation improve we have simplified our recycling and now ask that only four items be put into the recycling bins;

Clean plastic bottles Clean cardboard Clean cans/tins Clean glass bottles

Unwanted pewslips can be left in church.



Especially in the kitchen, if you have items that you know are recyclable but not accepted in our bins, please take them home and recycle them there. There are signs on each bin to tell us what is accepted. Please read these signs and make sure that your waste goes into the correct bin. The people monitoring these bins will be very grateful.

WORDSEARCH - GIFTS OF THE WISE MEN

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? One Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote the much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.



If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first Gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had!


