In 2023, 21% of people who menstruate struggled to afford period products.

'All who are affected have the right to manage their periods without shame or stigma'.

During the six weeks of Lent we would welcome donations of sanitary towels, tampons and maternity pads. If anyone is not comfortable buying these items themselves they can make a donation and the items will then be purchased on their behalf.

HELPING THOSE LESS FORTUNATE THAN OURSELVES

FOOD BANK: we were very upset recently when one of our clients was stabbed to death, allegedly by one of his house mates in a HMO (House of Multiple Occupancy). He was a most interesting man originally from Iran who was always ready to discuss philosophy. He was about to be baptised at St John's Sparkhill. Yet another terrible death by stabbing.

It's strange how there are cycles of requests. Towards the end of last year we were being asked for small saucepans and thanks to your generous donations we were able to (very sparingly - sorry for the split infinitive, you purists!) help folks with not only a saucepan but also a wooden spoon to stir its contents. Since then we have had a series of folks with no cooking facilities bar a kettle. Thus the current request for instant mash and noodles, cup a soups, instant custard, pots of porridge, and anything else of that ilk.

In an effort to encourage breast feeding, it's our policy not to offer Baby Food Powder, though we do occasionally offer it to HIV mothers who don't breast feed. We do offer baby biscuits and jars of meals which help with a family's budget.

Every week we are asked for nappies, larger sizes usually because midwives can help with the first sizes, and wet wipes. I have a particular soft spot for nappies since many years ago Margaret Barber and I dealt with a two year old who had been in the same nappy all day and was soaked through his trousers, socks and shoes! It broke our hearts.

GrowBaby has reopened on Tuesday mornings in term time by appointment, which allows the helpers to give more attention to each mother (and they usually are the mothers though the occasional Midwife and Health Visitor goes for supplies). Currently they are looking for two Moses baskets with bedding, nappy cream and first size feeding bottles.

CLIMATE JUSTICE

The gap between rich and poor is a reflection on how far we fall short of God's plans for us! People in the global south struggle to make a living for themselves from subsistence farming while producing luxury crops and goods for export to wealthier nations. They contribute least to the pollution which causes global warming yet are most at risk from the extremes of weather brought by climate change.

What can we do about this injustice? Buying fairly traded produce and supporting campaigns which protect and assist producers are two worthwhile actions and there is plenty of information to be found on the Transform Trade website. (Sainsburys stock Fairly Traded cashews)

The PCC has also agreed that the Parish should support a project run by Transform Trade to support cashew nut farmers in Tanzania. A small monthly donation will help to develop a business which produces this very nutritious product in a climate-friendly way, giving income to the farmers to care for and educate their families, then extending the project to employ more workers.

CHRIST IN THE WILDERNESS

The English painter, Stanley Spencer, (!891-1959) produced a series of works entitled: *'Christ in the Wilderness'*. During this time of Lent Spencer's paintings offer an opportunity to reflect and consider some of the themes that inspired his art.

Spencer was born and lived in Cookham, Surrey and many of the figures he paints depict the people of Cookham in a variety of biblical scenes. For example, the painting called 'The Hen' shows an unusual Christ figure, much larger than we might imagine, in the wilderness watching a hen with her brood. There are cockerels in the background keeping guard as it were. (See page 17)

In the gospels of Matthew and Luke we read: 'O Jerusalem...how often have I longed to gather your children together as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings...' The metaphor represents the tender love and protection that Jesus offers to those who trust in Him. It's notable that the group in Spencer's painting is joined by a different bird which appears to be an outsider giving the sense that everyone, of whatever race or creed, is welcomed into the generous love and protection of God.

God's enduring love found a place in the hearts of the Desert Fathers and Mothers who were early Christian monastics living in solitude in the deserts of Egypt, Palestine and Syria. They left behind the comforts of society to pursue a life dedicated to contemplation and prayer.

A former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, wrote in his book, *The Wisdom of the Desert*, 'The journey into the desert is a journey into a particular kind of spaciousness'. Spacious, perhaps, in a way that leads us to re-think what we need to change or improve in our lives.


May God, grant you space and a time for reflection in this time of Lent as you draw near to Christ in the Wilderness.



MOTHERING SUNDAY - March 30th

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.


Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families, which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed, and in many ways now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.



MARCH WORDSEARCH


March brings us Lent and Mothering Sunday.

IAN COLE

We were saddened to hear of the death of Ian Cole just a few days before Christmas, and many from our churches were able to attend his funeral in January.

His older brother, Richard, had originally thought there would be very few at the funeral – he had no idea of Ian's various links in the community and churches of the Shirley area. As it was the chapel at Robin Hood was comfortably full.

At the service Richard talked about lan's struggles with his autism and how that affected his life. There were some great stories which resonated with the memories many of us had of lan. Two stories stood out for me.

Like many people with autism, Ian was a hoarder. In his younger years he hoarded screws and plugs. He used to go with his mother to visit her friends at various coffee mornings. Ian would often take a pocketful of old screws and a screwdriver with him. While there, he would head off to the loo and carefully unscrew the shiny screws holding toilet roll holders to the wall and replace them with his old rusty ones. Gradually his mother's friends began to notice, and it soon became apparent that they had all been affected. They wanted to start a "we have been screwed by Ian Cole" club!


Later, envelopes became his passion. Not the contents just the envelopes themselves. Ian managed to acquire a litter picker and as he walked the streets of Shirley would often see envelopes in people's porches. He would carefully extract them with his litter picker, open them, discard the contents and take the envelopes home. If you have ever come home and found your post spread over your front garden and the envelopes nowhere to be seen this might explain the mystery! Richard said that when his and Ian's mum died, he had to clear the house and took more than a ton of envelopes to the tip!

Ian had many health problems – high blood pressure, diabetes and more – and he died peacefully in his sleep as his heart gave out.

We will all miss you Ian – we will miss your bizarre streams of questions; the bagful of sandwiches and the Disney tee shirt. Thank you for the memories – may you rest in peace and rise in glory!
