




POPPY UPDATE

Val Sperrey opened the June meeting with a warm welcome to all and introduced our speaker Rev. Kathy Lloyd Roberts for a talk on 'How I Became a Vicar.'

Kathy gave us a very lively and amusing talk on her journey to becoming a vicar starting at the age of twelve, way before the Ordination of women priests. Kathy qualified as a primary school teacher, later moving over into further education. During this time, she married Alwyn and raised a family. In 2003 the call was still there, and she embarked on her journey through Queen's College in Birmingham as a part-time student to train to become a priest whilst continuing working full time.

Kathy accepted a placement at St Mary's Church, Temple Balsall and after being ordained in 2006 was appointed curate there. In 2007 the Vicar at St. Mary's, Rev. James Woodward, was appointed to the Residentiary Canonry of Saint George's Chapel in Windsor Castle creating a vacancy at St. Mary's. After a long and careful consideration Kathy applied for the post on the closing date. Following a successful interview Kathy was appointed as Master of the Foundation and Vicar of St Mary's Church, Temple Balsall in 2008, which she will continue to tell in part two. Kathy remained at Temple Balsall for thirteen years until retirement. We look forward to welcoming Kathy back next year.

'Summer Hunger' is used by charities to refer to the school holidays when young children fail to get the free term time Breakfast Club and lunchtime meals. And they go hungry.

Perhaps we can do something about it this summer holiday? Strengthen the supplies at "our" Food Bank to supplement the extra demand on it? Let's have a special appeal on a particular Sunday (as happened at Easter for Easter eggs) for the types of foods which would usually be given out at the Breakfast Clubs?

The items we have in mind are **UHT milk (full fat or semi skimmed)**, boxes of cereal, and long-life orange juice.

When my sons were young, they seemed to be circling the kitchen like hungry sharks all the time, progressing from meal to snack to meal again. But I don't think they really knew what it is to ache with hunger ...



If you are in a position to do so, please, please bring your donation to church on **Sunday July 7th** for us to augment the supplies at "our" Food Bank. St Patrick's are hoping to join in this appeal too so between us we should be able to make a real difference to hungry Little Beings.



The Dress Circle by Laurie Graham

Generally, the feeling about this book was that we were not too sure at first, as we needed to get used to the 'accent' it is written in. The characters and story are based in Alvechurch and they use the grammar and vocabulary of the area, which you need to adjust to.


However, we all thought that there were likeable characters, and we could feel for all of them in their situations. The family reactions felt very realistic and the way it ended meant we didn't know what the outcome actually was. The story demonstrated how judgmental we can be, even though we know someone really well. It was interesting to see how 'Ba', one of the main characters, reacts initially, but then she becomes more educated, learns and acceptance follows. It



shows how we all can react initially and then adapt as we learn more.

Several of the group thought that the narrative was very like the style of comedians such as Victoria Wood, Jasper Carrott, Alan Bennett and more recently, Joe Lycett. Some of the words and phrases are of the time the book was written which probably wouldn't be used today.

Overall, it was surprisingly good and very easy to engage with.



The next book we will be reading is 'I Let You Go' by Clare Mackintosh, we'll be discussing it at 2pm on Monday 22nd July, in Church House.

ST JAMES'S DAY CELEBRATION

Thursday 25th July is the feast day of St James the Great who is the Patron Saint of St James Church. There is a stained-glass window which shows St James, dressed as a pilgrim, to the right of the high altar.

In order to mark the day, there will be a Eucharistic service starting at **10.30am** which will include prayers for healing. Following the service, we will be showing a video (in

church) of a group of pilgrims as they walk to the shrine of St James, which is in the Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela, Northern Spain. Many thousands of pilgrims, from around the world, follow the Way of St James every year to reach the shrine and to worship in the cathedral. Some walk the route; some cycle or go on a coach pilgrimage and others travel by horse back.





The video lasts approximately thirty minutes and will be followed by tea/coffee and Tarta de Santiago, which is a speciality of the Galician region of Spain, dating back to Medieval times, and is closely associated with the pilgrim route.

Please do join us for this special day; everyone is welcome.

I was amazed at the breadth and depth of the exhibition which involved led sessions on Meditation, Intercessory Prayer, Prayer Walking, Poetry and Prayer, Celtic Prayer, Ignatian Examen, and the place of Icons (holy paintings) in prayer. Having so nourished our souls on all these and many other wonderful aspects of prayer we were treated to refreshments!



I was then able to help myself to some of the free booklets and other items related to prayer and left praising God in my heart and giving thanks for His goodness to us.

LABYRINTHS

I had many interesting comments from people who came to our recent Pathways to Prayer event, but the item on which I received the most feedback was the Labyrinth.

A labyrinth looks a bit like a maze, but it is very different. Whereas a maze is designed to get you lost with a lot of dead ends and paths to avoid, a labyrinth has just one path that leads to the centre – you cannot get lost if you stay on the path. But what is it for, and why and how is it used in prayer? A labyrinth consists of a winding path to reach the centre, and walking this winding path can help us unwind, help us to let go of things that trouble us and to rest in God.

There are many labyrinths around – many retreat houses have them. There are even some in public places – Kate and I recently found one in a park alongside the river in Hereford. But for many of us, actually walking a labyrinth is not practical. This is where the finger labyrinth comes in.

On the next page you will find a simple labyrinth. This is a finger labyrinth, one on which you can trace the path with your finger. Here are some helpful hints as to how this can help you in prayer.

You can use the labyrinth in many situations – these are just examples, and the list is by no means exhaustive! You might want to:

- Read and reflect on a passage of scripture
- Hold a memory or picture of someone you wish to pray for
- Reflect on an experience where you are seeking healing or forgiveness
- Reflect on something you wish to have guidance on
- Use the labyrinth as a way of giving thanks to God

First find somewhere quiet to sit, then place the finger labyrinth on a table or tray in front of you. You might like to play some quiet music or light a candle.

Once you are still, pray these or similar words

Almighty God, I am always in your presence.

You walk with me on my path through life;

Your words guide my steps; your Spirit feeds my soul.

May I always listen to your voice;

May I love and serve you all my days

Through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Then begin to slowly trace the labyrinth path with a finger on your non-writing hand. As you trace the path, notice what is happening in your mind and heart. Bring what is on your heart to God. Let your prayer unfold and trust that God will speak to you as you trace the path.

If your mind wanders to thoughts that seem like distractions, name the distraction, lift it up to God and ask God to guide your mind and heart back to him. If the distraction returns, explore it with God.

When you reach the centre of the labyrinth, thank God for having walked with you along the way. Spend some time in prayer and reflection as you receive God's love and blessing.

When you are ready, trace your return along the same path. Return gratefully and prayerfully recognising and reflecting on any changes in your feelings, any words you have heard from God and any decisions made. As you leave the labyrinth, give thanks and praise to God.

Can I encourage you to give it a go – it may be just the prayer tool you need!

SIMPLER RECYCLING

You will have read Kate Crocker's article in the June magazine, following on from the Greenpeace Plastic Count survey in which some of us participated individually as well as collectively as a church. The results for Church House in particular would have been graded in Ofsted speak as "Room For Improvement" if not "Special Measures"!

With so many functions taking place in Church House in particular, it is difficult to keep our recycling clean and "good to go". Unfortunately, this results in the good recycling efforts made by many going to waste, or, more precisely, to landfill, because when greasy paper or contaminated food wrappings are added, the whole recycling contents become unrecyclable.

With this in mind, we have decided to restrict what we will all collect in Church House for recycling. The labelled bins in Church House can be used for

- *CLEAN CARDBOARD
- *CLEAN PLASTIC BOTTLES
- *CLEAN CANS/TINS
- *GLASS BOTTLES

Everything else to general waste. All paper products are excluded for the reasons given above.

In St James Church, there will be a receptacle for old pew slips and this will be clearly marked.

We do hope this helps us all to become "Outstanding" recyclers, using an Ofsted analogy again! (Apologies to teachers.)

JULY & AUGUST ECO TIPS FROM A ROCHA UK

Taste the benefits of seasonal and local food. Plan to incorporate locally grown produce into your diet and shopping list throughout the seasons, as it is harvested at its peak ripeness, ensuring superior flavour compared to imported alternatives that have travelled thousands of miles. If saying grace before a meal is a regular practice in your household, this month, include giving thanks for your local food producers.

Assist local wildlife during hot weather. Provide hedgehogs with a juicy snack like mealworms or canned dog food as their prey of slugs, snails and worms diminishes, and ensure a safe exit for them and other small mammals if you have a garden pond. Help garden birds by maintaining a filled bird bath and supplying supplementary food, including black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins, currants, mealworms and a nutritious seed mixture, when natural supplies become scarce.



If seafarers seem irrelevant to your daily life, think again: 90 per cent of everything you buy in the shops comes to you by sea. Merchant seafarers quite literally keep our global economy afloat. Yet it is a tough life, far from loved ones. Merchant ships are harsh working environments, never mind the threat of piracy or even shipwreck.

To help the seafarers, a worldwide network of port chaplains has sprung up. They offer hospitality and friendship, as well as practical, emotional and spiritual support, providing almost a 'home from home' in hundreds of ports, in more than 50 countries. You might wish to support one of these three well-known societies: The Mission to Seafarers (Anglican), The Apostolate of the Sea (Roman Catholic), and The Sailors' Society

(inter-denominational).


