

SMALL PILGRIM PLACES NETWORK (SPPN)

Recently I heard about the Small Pilgrim Places Network, places that offer space for praying, pondering, meditating, thinking, breathing, just being, with God. Many are churches, a few are gardens, labyrinths, holy wells. The movement was begun by Jim Cotter, an Anglican priest and poet, and the places of pilgrimage are where people of any faith or none can come to sit, without pressure to believe or to do anything.

On the SPPN website (https://www.smallpilgrimplaces.org) I found that the nearest one to me was just twelve minutes away by bus, so I went to find out what it was all about. The church is St Michael's, Hall Green, over the road from the bus stop, a modern open plan building. There was a music session taking place and one of the people there, Anne, came across to greet me and show me to the small chapel. She returned a few minutes later with coffee and biscuits, inviting me to stay as long as I wanted. When I said that I was from St James's it transpired that she was licensed as a reader at our church!



The chapel is a small hexagonal (6 sided) building with a floor to ceiling window, about twelve inches wide, in each wall. This gives privacy but with sight of the busy roads, pavements and shops outside. There were three wall hangings, all hand stitched, a traditional embroidery of flowers and butterflies, a picture in fabrics of the stone being rolled away, and an intricate embroidery of the cross surrounded by briars. I sat there for some time then waved to the music group as I left.

Going back to the article I read about SPPN, the first place mentioned is a tiny chapel carved into the rock in Knaresborough, North Yorkshire, a place that I have known all my life ... but that's another story.

MARK, MITES, AND MESSAGES

Since we have family abroad our Christmas presents to them need to be made or bought and posted early. So, it's an Autumn sun overhead as I saw, sand and varnish small oak stands recycled from our old banisters and rails. Each one will carry a 2000 year old mite, a word used to describe the coin used in Judea all those centuries ago to buy olives, oil or suchlike. Also, a word abbreviated from 'minute' by the 1611 translators to illustrate its low denominational value found in the Mark and Luke narratives of the widow's mite parable. I can find no reason why Stuart coinage wasn't used back then. After all, our Victorian revised version uses "penny" whilst another translation, a "farthing" but no matter.

There is something powerful in their aged fragility which reinforces the parable's message. Perhaps the Oak of Righteous found in Isaiah will match that sturdy wood which I'm working on. It brightens up under my plane, an action I'm hoping will dispel my brain's confusions and offer the challenge and comfort of faith instead. Now that would be a present really worth having.



We talked about how life was so different during these war years, not only with rationing, but also with the hard work involved with the simplest of tasks, such as washing sheets, and also with the men coming home from the pit and having a bath, taking off their clothes in the hall and then all three of them in turn, bathing in the same water.

I wonder what was going through the wise men's minds as they set out to follow the star? They were probably unsure about exactly where they were going or what they would find when they got there. They didn't really know what they were letting themselves in for – perhaps they were a bit fearful of the whole venture.

Maybe that how you feel sometimes. You're not sure quite where your life is heading; not sure what each day will bring and perhaps you feel a bit anxious about things generally as you think about your own life and what's going on in the world around us. One of the phrases that comes several times in the Christmas story is "do not be afraid". It was spoken to Zechariah; it was spoken to Mary; it was spoken to Joseph and it was spoken to the shepherds. It's not recorded in the Bible, but I wonder if those words were spoken to the wise men too as they set out on their journey. The words "do not be afraid for I am with you" are words that I have often heard God say to me.

This Christmas, as we have done for the last couple of years, we will be giving away some booklets called "Follow the Star – Calm and Bright". They contain a reading and a short thought for each day from Christmas to Epiphany (6th January). They focus on what a *Calm and Bright* Christmas might mean for ourselves, our families, our community and our world. A real message of hope in what are often hard and confusing times.

Please take one for yourself, but also please consider taking one for a neighbour or a friend as we spread the message of hope this Christmas time.

In addition to the booklets there are also bookmarks with the same message and a card for families with a Christmas Tree Dove decoration to make. The daily readings can also be found using the "follow the star" app.



DEMONSTRATOR PARISHES

You may have heard that St James's has been invited by the Church of England to apply for 'Demonstrator status' ... what does this mean?

The Church has pledged to reach net zero carbon emissions by 2030 - a very challenging ambition. This means that parishes will need to move away from fossil fuels for heating and find cleaner options. We have already done this in Church House, replacing the gas boiler with electric heating panels, all on a green tariff.

The Church boilers are over thirty-five years old, dirty, inefficient and unreliable. We have been working with the Diocese for two years to look at solutions and have settled on a combination of heating panels and chandeliers (in the nave). Our plans are quite advanced and have Faculty permission which allows us to make our project a beacon for other churches looking for green heating. We will share our journey and evaluate our outcomes making data available to the wider Church.

In return, there is a lot of support from the Church, including a grant. The Parish (helped as ever by the Friends) will have to find some funding, which is not easy so soon after the huge effort we made to fund the Pod.

We hope to replace the heating in St James's next Spring. Meanwhile we are hoping that the boilers will hold out but it is advisable to come to services warmly dressed!



WORDSEARCH

Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the 3rd century in the Greek village of Patara, on what is today the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he suffered in prison with other bishops under the emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians.

One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings over our mantelpieces today. There was a poor family with three daughters who needed dowries if they were to marry, and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window – thus saving the girls from a life of misery. The bags of gold landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out stockings – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols of St Nicholas.







