

ST JAMES'S POD PROJECT - GOOD NEWS AND GLITCHES!

We have received a very generous grant from a Trust, which prefers not to be thanked publicly and this brings us within 10% of the funds we need. I have of course sent our thanks privately.

We have had to appoint a new Architect because Richard Crook, who was our Diocesan Architect for many years and drew up the plans for the pod, has now retired. Supervising a project like ours takes a lot of time and energy and we are lucky to have found a Birmingham-based firm which can do this, Stephen Oliver Architecture. They have a lot of experience in working on listed buildings and are registered with the Diocese for carrying out Quinquennial inspections of churches.

We have applied for a date to commence work on the first phase of the works, a sewer connection (the least attractive part of the project!) at the end of July. Road closure is easier in the school holidays and the weather should be better.

Before we can arrange for the rest of the work to be done, we need to have completed the fundraising. Trusts will not give money for work which has already started, and we cannot risk a shortfall. I am working on another grant application but if anyone still has ideas for money making events, however small, it demonstrates our continuing commitment to this major improvement for our Parish Church and helps with my appeals. If all goes well, we should be ready to instruct the builder in August but may have to wait for a starting date. Patience is a difficult but essential virtue to have in a project like this!



We welcomed Rowena Nicholls, Diocesan Trustee, to our May meeting who gave us an insight into her role at the Home Office on Asylum seekers. Rowena was very keen to tell us that she is a loyal Civil Servant and delivers what the Government wishes. Rowena said that if anybody is interested in statistics on asylums seekers and refugees in the UK, they are published by the Home Office in their quarterly immigration statistics and can be viewed on the Government website. She explained the difference between an asylum seeker who is somebody who has left their country and is seeking protection from persecution and serious human rights violations in another country, but who has not yet been legally recognized as a refugee and is waiting to receive a decision on their asylum claim. Whilst a refugee is someone who has been forced to flee his or her home because of war, violence, or persecution and is unable to return home until conditions in their native land are safe for them again. Until they receive a decision as to whether they are a refugee, they are known as an asylum seeker and do not have the same rights as a refugee in the UK. Asylum seekers are not allowed to work. Most asylum seekers are in the Conurbations and not in the Shires.

The speaker at our next meeting on **Wednesday 5th June** at 2pm will be Reverend Kathy Lloyd Roberts on 'How I Became a Vicar'.

All our meetings are held in Church House at 2pm on the first Wednesday in the month except for the August meeting.

Visitors are most welcome to any of our meetings.

BELLS RING OUT FOR SOLIHULL'S ANNIVERSARIES

Solihull Borough has recently celebrated some special civic anniversaries and bell ringers within the Borough were approached to help mark these occasions. Local churches with five or more bells were involved (could you name them all before reading on?), and all responded positively.

Included here is part of an article published in "The Ringing World", the ringers' weekly magazine, and is printed with the author's permission. You can ignore any technical language, but it tells you how the various churches responded. A photo of our own ringers is on the next page.

"There are ten towers with bells in the Solihull Borough and each of us were approached to mark the Borough Anniversaries, Monday 11th March and Monday Ist April. The towers are Barston, Berkswell, Bickenhill, Castle Bromwich, Hampton in Arden, Knowle, Meriden, Salter Street, Shirley and Solihull. Bickenhill and Salter Street don't have their own bands so a big thank you to Luke Daniel and Lucas Williams for arranging quarter peals, and to Simon Linford for helping out by arranging a peal band for Solihull. Most of the towers arranged some special ringing on one of the dates, a mixture of open ringing, quarter peals and a peal.

It was the 70th anniversary of Solihull becoming a Municipal Borough on 11th March 1954. There were two anniversaries on 1st April: the 60th anniversary of Solihull becoming a County Borough in 1964 and the 50th anniversary of Solihull becoming a Metropolitan District in 1974.

Solihull's Archivist and Local Studies Librarian, Tracey Williams, has recently herself become a bellringer, although she isn't learning locally. So when the Borough started thinking about how to mark the celebrations, she immediately thought of including us.

The Mayor visited St Alphege, Solihull on 11th March, with her consort, where she was 'shown the ropes' by Malcolm, our Tower Captain. Tracey, who accompanied her and rang with us at Solihull, then visited Barston on 1st April to join in with their ringing too. I know she enjoyed the tower grabs!

Happy Birthday Solihull!"

The bells of St James Church, Shirley played a very important part in 1954. As we were the nearest tower to the event, they must have been heard by Princess Margaret when she came here to oversee the creation of Solihull as a Municipal Borough. This ceremony took place in the former Odeon Cinema, a location most recently occupied by Morrisons. Our Ringing Master Colin Baugh was among the children lined up on the pavement to welcome her. Perhaps you were there, too?

VE DAY 2024

Victory in Europe Day is one of those dates which continues to hold a special significance for many in our country, especially those who have lifetime memories of the Second World War or its aftermath.

The Royal British Legion continues to be the custodian of keeping this momentous event, as well as many more, fresh in the minds of people of each generation.

Therefore, on Wednesday 8th May 2024 it was an enormous privilege for representatives from Shirley Parish to join up with the Shirley branch of the RBL as we paid public tribute to the service and sacrifice of the entire Second World War generation, from British, Commonwealth and Allied Forces to evacuees and those who served on the home front. THE GREAT PLASTIC COUNT - PART 2

Greenpeace has now published the findings of the plastic count. 225,000 people participated and their reports lead to an estimate of **1.7 BILLION pieces of plastic discarded in the UK PER WEEK!** This is horrifying and underlines the urgent need to stop using plastic packaging. We all need to reduce our use of plastic packaging and take every opportunity to make our views known to retailers, manufacturers, and government.

Our survey of St James Church and Church House bins showed significant amounts of plastic waste, perhaps increased by the monthly Messy Church and Lunch Club events both falling in the week of the survey.

The most concerning finding, however, was the contamination of our recycling bins with food, clingfilm, paper tissue and other non-recyclable items. This makes our recycled items unusable, and we regularly have to empty the recycling into general waste. The bins are clearly labelled but this does not seem to help.

What can we do? Recycling can be confusing. Some plastics can go in the recycling bin, others need to be taken to the supermarket and some won't recycle at all. Paper should be dry, clean and of good quality (no tissue, serviettes, hand towels). When in doubt the best thing is to use the general waste bin so that the contents of the recycling bin are not spoiled.

Maybe we should restrict what we recycle so that there is less confusion. Clean, dry glass, plastic drinks bottles, paper and card can all be put together to recycle with everything else going to general waste. Some publicity and conversations about getting this right should also help.

Recycling is not the answer but is better than burning or burying waste. We need to deliver our contribution in a usable state - every bit helps!

WE BELIEVE ...

For a few months, starting in June, our sermon series for Sunday mornings in all three churches will look at the foundations of our faith, examining various elements of the Nicene Creed. We all know it! It's the one that starts "We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty ..." We recite it most weeks, but have you ever stopped to think about what it really means?

The early church had a problem ... Jesus hadn't left a definitive list of do's and don'ts for His church. What was the Trinity, who is the Holy Spirit, what about baptism, and sin? It fell to Roman Emperor Constantine to convene the first conference of the great and the good to work it all out. They met in Nicaea, just outside Athens, Greece, in 325AD. It was the first attempt to create a uniform consensus in the Church on liturgy and prayer, agreeing and establishing worldwide foundations of belief.

However, like much of the church today, not everyone agreed on everything, and there was another conference in 381AD. This time it was held in Constantinople, modern day Istanbul, hoping to better reflect views of the Eastern Orthodox Church.

More than two thousand years of church history later and we still use those same words to affirm our beliefs. What we believe matters. It affects how we live, our behaviour, values and identity as Christians. So, let's take some time over the next few months to consider and prayerfully reflect. What we believe might change who we are!

THE EUROS 24





A former Liverpool Manager Bill Shankly famously said, 'Some people believe football is a matter of life and death, I am very disappointed with that attitude. I can assure you it is much, much more important than that!'

This month sees the start of the UEFA Euro 24 football tournament, which will be watched by millions across Europe and the world. Yet it also illustrates some key points about the Christian life. As Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13b,14).

A prize to be won: The dream of every player in the competition is to be able to hold up the Cup themselves. For us the prize is the eternal life, God's gift of relationship with Him for now and eternity through Jesus. But there's an important difference between football and the Christian faith. To win the Euros you have to be good enough, while Christ's love for us is undeserved and is not dependent on how well we've done.

Training to be undertaken: If a team is going to win Euro 24, they need to have trained hard beforehand. Our training, as Christians, starts the moment we accept the gift of God's life. On a daily basis, we must train ourselves to say *no* to the wrong things in our lives.

As we build up our *godly muscles*, we are better able to choose to do what is right in God's eyes. To enable us to do all this we need to engage in the spiritual disciplines of prayer, studying the Bible and being part of a church and small group. How is your training going?



HOT DRINKS, HOME-MADE CAKE AND CHAT

DO POP INTO CHURCH HOUSE AND SAY 'HELLO'!

USING REST TO PRAY

Most of us think of prayer as a very demanding activity, but did you know it can be extremely restful?

One of the great verses in the Bible says this: 'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10). It suggests we experience God most fully when we are still. When we cease rushing around, pausing for a moment of thought and recollection, we are becoming prayerful, and God is very near. Even a break for a morning coffee can be a moment of prayer, if we slow ourselves down and allow our thoughts to turn towards God.

An essential part of resting is to breathe slowly. Christian tradition has always made a connection between prayer and breathing. You can learn to pray to the rhythm of your breathing, using chosen prayer words to focus. As you breathe in, you might say 'Abba', and then as you breathe out, add the word 'Father'. Choose words which are meaningful to you, deliberately slowing your breathing so you become relaxed and peaceful.

Perhaps you have a favourite chair where you are able to unwind easily. For a few moments sit and do nothing. Simply become aware of the present moment, reminding yourself you are in the presence of God. As you feel yourself relax, bask in the knowledge of God's love and acceptance of you. Sense His smile of approval upon you. You don't have to do anything, just 'be' for a moment. This too is prayer.

Sometimes we are forced to rest by circumstances ... illness, disability, growing older and so on slow us down and we can't rush around like we used to do. Never mind. Don't fight against your circumstances. Enter into the place of rest that God is giving you. He loves you for who you are, not for what you do. Turn your thoughts into prayer and offer them to God. You don't need to advise God as to what He should do; simply hold people before Him, leaving the outcome to Him.

Prayer should be a natural expression of our relationship with God. Sometimes we have words, sometimes silence is enough. We don't need to impress God with our fervour. We can relax and be rested, even as we pray.

SHIELD ME

O may God shield me, and may God fill, O may God watch me, and may God hold; O may God bring me where peace is still, To the King's land, eternity's fold. Praise to the Father, praise to the Son, Praise to the Spirit, the Three in One.



ERASMUS, PATRON SAINT OF SAILORS

If so, then you'll have heard of St Elmo's Fire. It is the light that is sometimes seen on mastheads of boats after storms at sea. St Elmo is another name for St Erasmus, a fourth century Syrian bishop who was not afraid of violent storms. Legend has it that one day when Erasmus was preaching outside, a thunderbolt hit the ground right beside him. That might have distracted modern bishops, but not Erasmus – he just kept on preaching. His courage won him the respect of sailors, who made him their patron saint. Erasmus finally died during the Diocletian persecutions in 300AD, and his feast day is 2nd June.




